## Lesson 6. Weather

# 6.1. Learning goals

- to be able to discuss the weather using questions, positives, and negatives
- to be able to use 'very' (?iih) and 'a little bit' (-ckin)
- to be able to use the ending  $-2a\lambda$  when discussing weather

#### **6.2.** Conversations

# 6.4. Notes on talking about the weather

Words based on the root *?uuq*– refer to pleasant feelings, surroundings, or weather. The opposites of these meanings are expressed with the root *wiiq*–.

(1)	root	feeling		surroundings		weather	
	?uuq-	?uuqmis pl	leasant	?uu?uuquk	nice	?uqumḥi	calm
	wiiq-	wiiqmis ui	npleasant	wiiwiiquk	nasty	wiiqsii	stormy

You can make sentences out of weather words by adding a mood ending to them.

(2) ?uu?uuquk–ḥa. Is it nice? ?uu?uuquk–ma. It's nice. ?učqak–ḥa. Is it foggy? ?učqak–ma. It's foggy.

 $\infty$  **Exercise 1.** For each of these weather words, say the word alone, then build a question with -ha, then a statement with -ma.

ŻupaamilaaluqumhikwisaaluquuqukwiiqsiilucqakmałukyuliliwahakwiiwiiqukKupaa

Example. wiiqsii 'stormy', wiiqsiiha. 'Is it stormy?', wiiqsiima. 'It's stormy.'

To make a negative statement, use wikmaa 'it is not'.

(3) kwisaa-ma. It's snowing. wikmaa kwisaa. It isn't snowing. yu'i-ma. It's windy. wikmaa yu'i. It isn't windy.

Mood endings go after the first word of their sentence. If -ma follows a one-syllable stem (like wik or ?iih), then it is said -maa, with a long vowel. (See lesson 9.)

∞ **Exercise 2**. With a partner, ask yes-or-no questions about the weather. Answer appropriately. Use the same words as in Exercise 1.

Example. A. łiwaḥakḥa. 'Is it cloudy?' B. haa?a, łiwaḥakma. 'Yes, it's cloudy.' Example. A. miilaaḥa. 'Is it raining?' B. wik, wikmaa miilaa. 'No, it isn't raining'

## 6.5. Notes on 'very' and 'a little'

The word ?iiḥ means 'big' or 'very'. The ending -ckin means 'a little bit'.

(4) ?iiḥ-maa Åaḥiqs. It's a big box. ?iiḥ-maa ṁałuk. It's very cold. ?anaḥ?is-ma ṅačaalyak. It's a small book. Åupaa-ckin-ma. It's a little sunny.

∞ **Exercise 3**. For each weather word, make two sentences, saying that it is a little bit like that, and a lot like that. Use the same words as in Exercise 1.

Example. yu?ickinma. 'It's a little windy.' ?iiḥmaa yu?i. 'It's very windy.'

#### 6.6. Notes on $-2a\lambda$

The ending  $-2a\lambda$  indicates that something has changed from how it was before. It can be translated as 'now', or 'then', or not at all. It comes before mood endings.

(5)	?uuqumḥi–ma.	It's calm.	?uuqumḥi–?a%–ma.	It's calm now.
	k̇̃wisaa–ḥa.	Is it snowing?	ḱ <sup>w</sup> isaa–?aҲ–ḥa.	Is it snowing now?
	wiiqsii–ḥa.	Is it stormy?	wiiqsii–?a¾–ḥa.	Is it stormy now?
	?iiḥ–maa yu?i.	It's very windy.	?iiḥ–?a¼–ma yu?i.	It's very windy now.

 $-2a\lambda$  is a hardening ending. If its stem ends in one of the sounds  $/p t \lambda c \check{c} k k^w/$ , then it is pronounced  $-\dot{a}\lambda$ , and the preceding sound is glottalized. (See lesson 8.)

(6)	?učqak–ma.	It's foggy.	?učqak̇–aૠ–ma.	It's foggy now.
	wik–maa łiwaḥak.	It isn't cloudy.	wik–aλ–ma łiwaḥak.	It isn't cloudy now.
	?uu?uuquk-ḥa.	Is it nice?	?uu?uuquk̈ <sup>w</sup> –aૠ–ḥa.	Is it nice now?
	wiiwiiquk-ma.	It's nasty.	wiiwiiquk̇̀ <sup>w</sup> –aλ̇̃–ma.	It's nasty now.

The rounding of k to  $k^w$  in  $2uu2uuquk^wa\lambda$ ,  $wiiwiiquk^wa\lambda$  is a common change. The sounds k, q, x, x tend to round after u, uu, and before another vowel. (See lesson 9.)

 $\infty$  **Exercise 4**. Say these sentences. Then say them with  $-2a\lambda$ .

?uuqumḥiḥa. Is it calm? łiwaḥakma. It's cloudy.
kwisaama. It's snowing. ?učqakḥa. Is it foggy?
wiiwiiqukḥa. Is it nasty? ?iiḥmaa ?učqak. It's very foggy.

Example. ?uuqumhiha. 'Is it calm?' ?uuqumhi?a¾ha. 'Is it calm now?'

When -ckin and  $-2a\lambda$  appear in the same word, it is always in the order -ckin? $a\lambda$ .

 $\infty$  **Exercise 5.** Say these sentences. Find  $-c\dot{kin}$  and  $-2a\lambda$ , and say what they mean.

?aaqin?a¼ḥa ṅaas?ii. How is the day now? ?iiḥ?a¼ma ?uuqumḥi. It's very calm now. wiiqsiickin?a¼ma. It's a little stormy now.

?iiḥmaa kwisaa.It's very snowy.?učqakckinma.It's a little foggy.

 $\mathring{n}$ aši?i q<sup>w</sup>aa?a $\mathring{\lambda}$ ii  $\mathring{n}$ aas?ii. Look at how the day is now.

?iiḥ?aʎḥa ʎupaa. Is it very sunny now? miʎaackin?aʎma. It's raining a little now. You can talk about different places using ?aḥkuu 'here' and yee 'over there'.

∞ **Exercise 6.** With a partner, pretend that you are at different schools, far from each other, talking on the phone. Ask your partner how the weather is where they are. Use these phrases to describe where you are talking about.

?aḥkuuherehiłḥ ?iiḥ?ii qicuwiłat the big schoolyeeover therehiłḥ ?anaḥ?is?i qicuwiłat the little school

Example. A. ?aaqinḥa naas?ii yee. 'How is the weather over there?' Example. B. ?iiḥ?aʎma łiwaḥak ?aḥkuu. 'It's very cloudy here.'
